It is also essential to respect the other parent's time. Do not schedule doctor appointments or extracurricular activities during their visitation time without their consent. If you must interrupt their time, offer a makeup day immediately. This proactive approach shows the court that you value the other parent's role. If the other parent is the one interfering with your time, document it meticulously but do not retaliate.
